

Week 11: The Tabernacle — God Dwelling with His People

A Sabbath Family Bible Study

Scripture Reading: Exodus 25:1–9; 29:43–46; John 1:14 (KJV)

With Commentary Throughout

Exodus 25:1–2

“And the LORD spake unto Moses, saying, Speak unto the children of Israel, that they bring me an offering... every man that giveth it willingly with his heart...”

Commentary:

The tabernacle was built by freewill offerings from the people. God could have created it miraculously, but He chose to involve His people in its construction. This teaches that **God desires participation**—He dwells among those who give themselves willingly.

Exodus 25:8–9

“And let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among them.”

Commentary:

This is the heart of the tabernacle: **God desires to dwell with His people**. The Creator of the universe did not remain distant—He moved in. This anticipates Christ and the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. God is not merely to be obeyed—He is to be **with us**.

Exodus 29:43–46

“And there I will meet with the children of Israel... And I will dwell among the children of Israel, and will be their God.”

Commentary:

The tabernacle was the meeting place—the **center of worship, teaching, sacrifice, and**

fellowship. God's presence sanctified the camp. His nearness defined their identity. This foreshadows Christ dwelling with us, and also points to the Christian household becoming a miniature sanctuary.

John 1:14

"And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us..."

Commentary:

The Greek word for "dwelt" literally means "**tabernacled.**" Jesus is the fulfillment of the tabernacle—God in human flesh, dwelling with His people. The Old Testament tabernacle was a shadow; Christ is the substance.

 **Discussion Questions for All Ages**

Young Children:

- What was the tabernacle?
- Why did God want to live with His people?
- What kinds of things happened in the tabernacle?

Older Children & Teens:

- Why did God require the people to build the tabernacle exactly as He said?
- How was the tabernacle different from other buildings?
- How is Jesus like the tabernacle?

Adults:

- What does the tabernacle teach us about God's desire to dwell with us?
- How can our homes become places where God dwells?
- What role does reverence play in preparing a place for the Lord?

 **Psalm Reading****Psalm 84:1–4 (KJV)**

- 1 How amiable are thy tabernacles, O LORD of hosts!*
2 My soul longeth, yea, even fainteth for the courts of the LORD...
4 Blessed are they that dwell in thy house: they will be still praising thee. Selah.

Commentary:

The psalmist longed for the presence of God, even envying the birds that nested near the tabernacle. This reveals the **beauty and joy** of dwelling with the Lord—something we should cultivate in our hearts and homes.

 **Hymn: “O Thou in Whose Presence”**

Family Application Points

1. **Center Your Home on God's Presence:**

Just as the tabernacle was the center of Israel's camp, make worship, prayer, and Scripture the **center** of your household. Build rhythms around God's Word.

2. **Create Sacred Space at Home:**

Designate a special area for family worship or prayer—a small altar, table, or shelf—to remind the household that God dwells here.

3. **Practice Reverence and Order:**

Teach children that God is holy. As the tabernacle had precise order and rituals, our homes should reflect **order, beauty, and reverence** as fitting for places where God is welcomed.

4. **Offer Willing Participation:**

Just as God called for freewill offerings, encourage every family member to **contribute**—through song, prayer, service, and giving—to the life of worship in the home.

5. **Point to Christ, the True Tabernacle:**

Reaffirm that the tabernacle was a picture of Christ, who now dwells in us. Let your children see that **our lives and homes** are now living sanctuaries.



Closing Prayer

O LORD our God, You are holy, and yet You desire to dwell among us. Thank You for the tabernacle, where You first made Your presence known in the midst of Israel. Thank You even more for Jesus Christ, the true Tabernacle, who came to dwell among us and now lives within us by the Holy Spirit. Let our home be a place where You are honored, where prayer and praise are offered continually, and where Your presence is felt. Cleanse us, teach us, and draw near to us, that we may live as Your people and glorify You in all we do. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
