Week 7: The Call of Moses and God's Deliverance

A Sabbath Family Bible Study

Scripture Reading: Exodus 3:1–12; Exodus 6:1–8; Exodus 14:21–31 (KJV)

With Commentary Throughout

Exodus 3:1-2

"Now Moses kept the flock of Jethro his father in law... and the angel of the LORD appeared unto him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush..."

Commentary:

God often calls His servants while they are faithfully doing ordinary work. Moses, once a prince, is now a humble shepherd. Yet God chooses him—not from a throne, but from the wilderness. The burning bush is a symbol of God's presence: pure, consuming, yet not destroying. It is a holy moment, marking a divine call.

Exodus 3:7-8

"And the LORD said, I have surely seen the affliction of my people... and I am come down to deliver them..."

Commentary:

God is not distant. He sees, hears, and knows the suffering of His covenant people. His deliverance is not only from slavery, but unto something—a land, a purpose, a future. This is always His pattern: salvation *from* bondage is always salvation *for* obedience and dominion.

Exodus 3:10-12

"Come now therefore, and I will send thee unto Pharaoh... Certainly I will be with thee..."

Commentary:

God doesn't send Moses alone—He goes with him. The presence of God is what transforms weakness into strength. Moses' call is not based on eloquence or power but on God's commission. Every calling God gives is accompanied by His presence and provision.

Exodus 6:6-7

"I am the LORD, and I will bring you out... and I will redeem you with a stretched out arm... And I will take you to me for a people, and I will be to you a God..."

Commentary:

God's covenant with Israel is personal. He redeems not merely to rescue, but to establish relationship. "I will be your God, and you shall be My people." This is the heart of deliverance: restoration into right covenant standing with the LORD.

Exodus 14:21-22

"And Moses stretched out his hand over the sea... and the waters were divided. And the children of Israel went into the midst of the sea upon the dry ground..."

Commentary:

God's deliverance is miraculous and complete. What was impossible became a pathway. The Red Sea crossing represents death to the old life and entrance into new covenant identity. It is a shadow of baptism, of total separation from the bondage of Egypt (the world).

Exodus 14:30-31

"Thus the LORD saved Israel that day... and Israel saw the great work... and the people feared the LORD, and believed the LORD, and his servant Moses."

Commentary:

God's deliverance builds faith and godly fear. After judgment on Egypt and salvation through the sea, the people recognize the power of God and the authority of His servant. True deliverance always leads to reverence and obedience.

🗣 Discussion Questions for All Ages

Young Children:

- Who spoke to Moses through the burning bush?
- What did God ask Moses to do?
- How did God help His people cross the sea?

Older Children & Teens:

- Why do you think God chose Moses, even though he was unsure of himself?
- What do we learn about God's power from the Red Sea miracle?
- How does this story show us God cares for His people?

Adults:

- What does Moses' calling teach us about God's method of choosing leaders?
- How can we prepare our families to trust God in uncertain or fearful times?
- In what ways has God delivered your household in the past—and how should that shape your obedience today?

Psalm or Hymn to Sing

Psalm 46:1-3, 10-11 (KJV)

1 God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

2 Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed...

10 Be still, and know that I am God...

11 The LORD of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge.

Commentary:

This Psalm reflects the same truth Israel experienced at the Red Sea—God is a mighty deliverer. Even when all seems lost, He is present and powerful.

Application Points

1. Trust in God's Call and Timing:

Teach your children that God often uses unlikely people for great purposes. Encourage humility, readiness, and faith—even in "wilderness" seasons.

2. Reflect on Past Deliverances:

Have a family testimony time: share stories of when God provided, protected, or delivered your household. Record these in a family journal.

3. Fear God, Not Man:

Moses stood before Pharaoh without fear because he stood with God. Teach your family to fear the Lord—not political powers, bullies, or peer pressure.

4. Walk in Obedience After Deliverance:

God delivered Israel not for laziness, but for worship and obedience. Challenge your family to serve God wholeheartedly in response to His mercy.

5. Honor Righteous Leadership:

Moses was God's appointed leader. Families should honor godly headship in the home

and respect righteous authority in church and nation.



Closing Prayer

O Lord of deliverance, we bless Your holy name for the mighty works You performed through Moses. Thank You for seeing the affliction of Your people and coming down to save. Help us to walk in trust as Moses did, to obey Your calling, and to lead our households in faith through the sea of this wicked world. Strengthen the fathers to lead with boldness, mothers to support with strength, and children to follow in faith. May our home be a testimony of Your power and a vessel of Your purpose.
