Week 8: The Plagues of Egypt — God's Judgment on False Gods

A Sabbath Family Bible Study

Scripture Reading: Exodus 7:1–5; 8:16–19; 9:13–16; 12:12 (KJV)

With Commentary Throughout

Exodus 7:1-5

"And the LORD said unto Moses, See, I have made thee a god to Pharaoh... And the Egyptians shall know that I am the LORD..."

Commentary:

God's confrontation with Pharaoh is not just political—it is theological. Pharaoh thought of himself as a god, but the LORD sends Moses and Aaron to show who truly rules heaven and earth. Each plague is a blow to Egypt's false gods—idols of nature, fertility, health, and power. The battle is between Yahweh, the true God, and the counterfeit deities of a pagan empire.

Exodus 8:16–19 (Third plague – Lice)

"Then the magicians said unto Pharaoh, This is the finger of God..."

Commentary:

Even Egypt's sorcerers reach their limits. Their imitation of power ends, and they are forced to confess the divine source behind the plagues. God's judgments expose false religion. This is how He brings nations to their knees—not merely through signs, but by discrediting their gods.

Exodus 9:13-16

"Let my people go... For I will at this time send all my plagues upon thine heart... that thou mayest know that there is none like me in all the earth."

Commentary:

The plagues aren't random—they are precise acts of judgment aimed at the very heart of Egyptian theology. The Nile, sun, frogs, livestock, and even Pharaoh himself are struck down to demonstrate that there is no god but Yahweh. His purpose is clear: "that thou mayest **know**"—God's judgments reveal His supremacy to both His people and their enemies.

Exodus 12:12

"For I will pass through the land of Egypt... and against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment: I am the LORD."

Commentary:

God identifies His target: the gods of Egypt. Each plague dismantles a part of Egypt's false religious structure. Hapi (god of the Nile), Heget (frog goddess), Geb (earth god), Hathor (cow goddess), Ra (sun god), and others are humiliated. The plagues are not chaos—they are holy warfare.



Discussion Questions for All Ages

Young Children:

- What happened when Pharaoh disobeyed God?
- Who was more powerful—Pharaoh or God?
- What was your favorite plague and why?

Older Children & Teens:

- Why do you think God sent so many plagues instead of just one?
- How did each plague show that the Egyptian gods were false?
- What "false gods" do people follow today?

Adults:

What modern institutions or ideologies does God judge today like He did Egypt?

- How do we respond when God's judgment exposes idols in our own lives?
- How can families prepare to stand firm when God judges a nation?

Psalm Reading

Psalm 96:4-5 (KJV)

"For the LORD is great, and greatly to be praised: he is to be feared above all gods. For all the gods of the nations are idols: but the LORD made the heavens."

Commentary:

This Psalm affirms exactly what the Exodus plagues proved: the gods of the nations are nothing, but the LORD is Creator and King. In every generation, His glory demands that idols fall.

₩ Hymn: "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God"

A mighty fortress is our God,
A bulwark never failing;
Our helper He, amid the flood
Of mortal ills prevailing.

Application Points

1. Identify and Renounce Modern Idols:

Talk as a family about false "gods" today—money, fame, self, government, technology. Identify any in your home or habits, and commit to removing them.

2. Discuss God's Judgments in History:

Study historical examples where God has judged nations (e.g., Babel, Rome, modern empires). Teach your children that God still brings nations low.

3. Stand Firm in a Pagan Culture:

Like Israel in Egypt, we must learn to live set apart even under unjust systems. Encourage your family to reject compromise and cling to God's Word, even if society mocks them.

4. Fear the True God:

The purpose of the plagues was to teach **reverent fear**. Practice daily worship, prayer,

and Scripture reading to cultivate a holy fear of the LORD in your home.

5. Sing the Hymn Together:

Teach your family the powerful truths of A Mighty Fortress Is Our God. Explain its history and message, then sing it together with strength.



Closing Prayer

Almighty God, You are the Judge of all the earth. You alone are worthy of worship, and You will not share Your glory with another. Just as You struck down the gods of Egypt, we ask that You expose and destroy the idols of our time. Begin with our own hearts—reveal to us anything we trust more than You. Strengthen our family to stand firm when the world follows lies. May our home be filled with holy fear, worship, and obedience. Let us proclaim, in this generation, that there is no god but the LORD. In the name of Jesus Christ, the true Deliverer, we pray. Amen.
